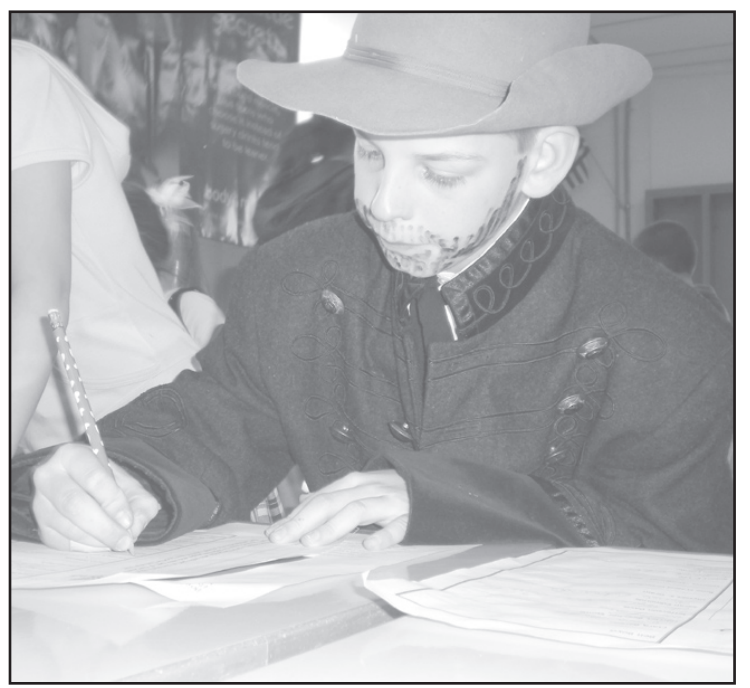

Miss Edmonds dressed as a boy named Franklin Thompson and joined the Northern Army. She served in the army until she came down with malaria. She

quit then because she was afraid they would find out she was a girl. She married Linus Seelye and had three children, who all died at a young age. She lived to be 58 years old.

Construction on steps to begin soon

The courthouse steps project is moving along.

People should be able to dance on the courthouse steps by the first of July, said Cary Stupka, contractor, at the pre-construction meeting on Thursday.

Held at the courthouse, others attending the meeting were Eric Johnson, architect with Campbell and Johnson, Concordia; Paul Underwood, Mid-Continental Restora-

tion, Fort Scott, Cary Stupka, contractor with Stupka Construction, Concordia; and commissioners, Andy Beikman and Dale Patton. Also sitting in on the meeting were Dave Flemming, county road and bridge supervisor; and Terry Miller, clerk.

Mr. Stupka will begin construction on the steps the end of this month and expects it to be a six-week project. If that is the case, the steps will be done by the middle of June but, giving the first of July as

the completion date will give the contractor additional time for inclement weather.

Parking will be limited in that area. Mr. Stupka plans to keep the equipment and materials limited to the immediate work area and, at the end of each day, will clean up the area. There will be a fence and signs to keep people off of the work site.

Bills will be submitted to Mr. Johnson and 10 percent will be withheld until the end of the project.
