She also gave her a copy of Jenny Joseph's poem "Warning," whose opening lines read: "When I am an old woman I shall wear purple, With a red hat that doesn't go and doesn't suit me."

She repeated the gift on request and nose drops and needles for several times, and eventually the group all bought purple outfits and held a tea party.
