The Diamond Jubilee Celebration of Sawhill Park will be held starting at 2 p.m. on Sunday. In honor of the occasion, there will be a patriotic ceremony and the launch of 75 balloons to mark the 75th birthday of the park.

It will also be an opportunity to raise money to repair the band shell. Considerable damage has been caused by water and people will be able to look in and see what needs to be done. They will also be able to view some of the artwork on the walls painted by Howard T. Sawhill, one of the originators of the park.

**Band shell repairs** 

At just a glance, the band shell appears to be in good condition but, after a tour through the back interior, there are some obvious problems including water damage. The roof is in bad condition, the downspouts are missing and the drainage is poor. The plaster on the outside is actually contributing to the water damage, allowing water to seep between it and the original exterior brick walls. This has caused the lath, plaster walls and ceiling to

Because the park is on the National Historic Register, it qualifies for a restoration grant of at least \$90,000. Since these are 80/20 matching grants, it is necessary to have 20 percent of the requested amount in hand before ever submitting the grant. The money raised at the Diamond Jubilee Celebration, said Mrs. Carman, committee member, will go toward that 20 percent.

Dorothy Smestad, committee member, said the amount to match the grant is right at \$22,000 and they have already raised almost \$2,000 but it is a far cry from the money needed.
