William Charles Boyson

Dec. 26, 1915 – May 19, 2009

William Charles Boyson died on

May 19, 2009, at the age of 93 in Atwood, Kan.

Bill was born the day Christmas Dec. 1915, on farm north Bird City to Nis Nelson Boyson Catherine (nee:



Comstock) Boyson. Nis Boyson was a homesteader who emigrated from Denmark in the late 1800's. Nis Boyson brought the first steam threshing outfit to western Kansas at that time. Bill was the first born of four

children, living in a sod house for a brief period of time. Bill moved his family to Washington state, where he met and married Naomi "Dolly" Nash on Dec. 11, 1941.

Bill worked briefly in the timber industry for his father-in-law's logging outfit. Among his other duties, he was a high climber who topped the big fir trees.

Bill moved to Los Angeles, Calif., at the beginning of World War II where his twin sons, Ronald and Donald, were born while he went to Consolidated Aircraft College during the day and worked nights at the Dr. Pepper Bottling Company.

The Boysons moved to Tucson, Ariz., where Bill worked for Consolidated Aircraft instrument repairman.

After the war, Bill returned to Bird City where the family continued to reside for the remainder of his life. The family's third son, Michael was born in the St. Francis hospital.

Bill had a photography studio and spent 30 years as a photographer. He and his family photographed weddings, school pictures and family portraits. One of his photographs was featured as the coveted "Picture of the Week" in Life Magazine in 1948. The picture featured an old steam locomotive with a snow plow moving the snow from the railroad tracks between Bird City and McDonald.

Bill was buried less than a mile from the homestead where he was

He was preceded in death by his parents, Nis and Catherine, his two brothers, Leonard and Wesley, and a son Donald.

He is survived by his wife of 67 years, Dolly; his sister Lorraine of Placerville, Calif.; his two sons, Ronald and his wife Suzan of Scott City and Michael and his wife, Belinda of Bird City, 10 grandchildren, 14 greatgrandchildren, and one great-great grandchild.

In Bird City, with the help of Hal Sager, we completed an inventory of vacant and unoccupied homes and commercial properties, about 40 homes and several commercial properties. Vacant, does not necessarily mean available, but the large number does indicate that we have a nucleus of homes from which to work. Bird City has applied for a grant

which would provide some funding for demolition and renovation of some selected properties. We will be working with interested citizens in Bird City to further expand available housing options.

In Bird City as well, we completed a survey of businesses to get their opinions and suggestions. Without getting into all the details, they expressed optimism and an interest in participating in creating new businesses.

We created a draft business incentive plan for Bird City which is in the hands of the city council for business investment here

## **Cost-Share** Funds Available

The Cheyenne County Conservation District will be accepting cost-share applications for conservation practices, June 8 - June 30, 2009 at the Conservation Office in St. Francis.

Conservation practices include: Terraces. Terrace Rebuilds. Diversions, Livestock Tanks, Wells and Pipelines. Cross-Fencing, Pumping Plant for Water Supply, Rangeland Seeding, Spring Developments, Windbreaks, (i.e. Trees, Fabric Weed Barrier, Drip Irrigation Systems), and Failing Septic System Replacement.

All applications will be reviewed and ranked by the Conservation District Board of Supervisors and funded according to priorities recommended by the Kansas Water Plan. Costshare assistance rates are 50%-70%. Deadline to complete work is December 31, 2009.

Funding for the cost-share programs is provided by the State Conservation Commission through appropriations from the Kansas Water Plan and administered by the Cheyenne County Conservation District.
