

Hospital plan reviewed at last meeting

reviewed when the Cheyenne thoughts regarding the project County Hospital Board met on Thursday.

A conference call was held Garden City. Les put the facility the board to review and discuss. Mr. Carmichael said he had taken the suggestions of what needed to be improved and said there just wasn't enough space inside the footprint to add what is needed.

The board discussed what would be the best for the hospital and how to most economically address community and hospital needs.


