Sainty man dies

karen.k@nwkansas.com A St. Francis businessman died Wednesday, Sept. 23.

Robert "Bob" Yost died at the DePaul Health Center in St. Louis, Mo. He would have been 82 years old on Dec. 23.

Mr. Yost and his wife, Arnita, purchased Daniels Implement from Rich and Sylvia Daniels in the fall of 1967. The new business, located on U.S. 36, was called Yost Farm

Shortly after the purchase, they moved to St. Francis with their two sons, Steve and Dave. They had lived in Loveland, Colo., for 13 years where they farmed, fed cattle, built homes and raised bluegrass

In 1982, the Yosts added the Ford dealership and later moved the implement store east of St. Francis. In May 1996, they purchased the and, in March 1998, they added the Goodland farm supply business. There were now three Yost Farm Supply stores in the area.

Through the years, Mr. Yost was active in the St. Francis community and served as mayor from 1971 to 1975. During this time, the citywide celebration was held honoring astronaut, Ron Evan, who was born in St. Francis. As a result, NASA invited the Yosts to tour its facilities in Houston, Texas.

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
