The commissioners also resigned a cover letter which was in color for Cheyenne County Development's communications with prospective businesses.

Landfill

At a previous meeting, the commissioners had agreed to let the contractor tearing down the Bird City lumberyard bring items to the landfill with no charge. The agreement had the stipulation that he would remove the asphalt shingles, painted wood, concrete and tin. Instead, there has already been around 10 tons brought to the landfill which were mixed with the items that needed to be sorted. Unpainted wood can be burned. The commissioners also noted that only half of the building has been taken down so there could be 10 tons more.

We just paid \$50,000 to have a new hole dug, said Andy Beikman, commissioner, and we don't want to have it filled up with one project.

Mrs. Domsch, who is working with a building project in Bird City that will eventually have some houses demolished, noted that the commissioners had agreed to waive the landfill fee for that project. The commissioners said there needed to be a better understanding about what is brought to the landfill and how it is separated.

Dave Flemming, road and bridge department supervisor, said the company doing the work for the airport runway had asked if fees could be waived for that project. The commissioners de- commissioners' room in the cided that they would not waive courthouse.

Mr. Flemming had recently been to a meeting where another county had gone from their landfill to taking waste to a transfer station and the rates had doubled.

Emergency medical service department report

Jannelle Bowers, director for the emergency medical service, was concerned about having a backup for her position. If she needed to be gone for some reason, she said, there is no one to back her up. The commissioners agreed that there needed to be someone who could take over if needed.

Mrs. Bowers asked for 10 minutes executive session to discuss public safety. No decisions were made upon returning to regular session.

Mrs. Bowers told about an incident when the ambulance crew went to get gas and the credit card would not work. The commissioners agreed to have a backup bank account with \$100 in it which would be used only for emergencies.

Write offs for the ambulance department were \$6,719.

High Plains Mental Health

Carol Rogers, the county's representative for High Plains Mental Health, reported that a meeting is being held in Overland Park in hopes of getting a more fair way for counties to pay for the services. She said that they will be looking at population, assessed value, patients served and benefits the county gets from the association and the employees in the county. The propose plan is to pay as the services are needed/used.

Designs for vehicle plates will change

The design for personalized vehicle plates will change in 2010 and Kansas law requires all personalized plate holders to reorder new plates. The division of vehicles, Kansas Department of Revenue, will begin accepting reorders for the new 2010 to 2015 personalized license plates on Nov. 2.

The new personalized plate can only be picked up during the vehicle owner's renewal month in the year. Next week, over 55,000 letters

will be mailed to individuals able to retain their current plate combination. They should order plates when the letters are received.

Statutes require that plate combinations are now required to be unique. his means there can be only one of any specific combination within the state. Because of this change, the department of revenue will mail 31,600 letters to people who will not be allowed to retain their current combination. Since they are not



the first owner of their current combination, they must select a new unique combination.

The department of revenue is in the process of putting on their website the ability for individuals to type in a requested plate combination that will tell them immediately if it is available or

In the past, owners received two personalized plates to display on their vehicles. As a cost savings measure, the department of revenue will be issuing only one personalized plate. State law requires just one plate per vehicle which is put on the rear pumper.
