# Cheylin provides program to assist challenged students

students from pre-school and older with challenges with learning disabilities and hearing impairment.

Deb Grace, Speech/Language Therapist, MS, received her degree at Kansas State and is employed by Cheylin through the Northwest Kansas Educational Service Center out of Oakley.

Although most of her work is with pre-schoolers through early elementary, her work can include adults who have had a stroke and toddlers with speak recovery.

Mrs. Grace works part-time at Cheylin and full-time in St. Francis and more recently, Weskan. Along with Mary Moore the speech/language para educator who works full-time at Cheylin, they work with children as well as assisting parents to reinforce what is learned during speech session at home.

Mrs. Moore earned her Bachelors Science in Elementary Ed-

day and could reinforce what the children had learned," said Mrs. Grace.

Screening for potential learning challenges or physical disabilities begin before the children start school during the community screening the schools sponsor. However, teachers can and do refer students from classroom observations. Parents must be notified and permission granted before any child can participate in the program.

The program targets five areas of learning challenges that can prevent a child from succeeding academically. The area most common they come across is the articulation and enunciating sounds correctly, particularly in children ages 3 years through first grade. When taught at an early age, children learn quickly how to speak clearly.

Other common speech and language problem areas that are addressed are audio comprehension/ verbal expression, understanding what is heard, read and written, that Mary and I have worked with and speaking fluidly and smooth-

There are two areas that are not as common, voice, such as speaking hoarsely or through the nasal passages. Sometimes these conditions can be corrected with surgery and sometimes it is just a matter of practicing articulation and enunciating. The least common area is neurological and physical, such as autism.

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The program is designed to give the children the one-on-one attention they need to identify and give the child the tools to feel better about themselves and the confidence to speak up and be successful.

"The speech and language work is a consistently changing field, with improvements made every year," said Mrs. Moore.

Mrs. Grace believes in her job, she must be a good detective. First, she locates the learning challenge, then solves it with the tools she has.

Mrs. Grace adds, "I have never regretted a moment in the 33 years I have done this, and every child have learned something to help
