There seems to be "SPAMS" Treasury appearing all the time. And, like the old saying goes, if it seems too of your fiscal activity, we have good to be true, it probably isn't determined that you are eligible to legitimate.

One of the latest SPAMS is supposedly for an Internal Revenue on the e-mail is "IRS REFUND Notification - Please Read This."

Dolores Jenik, county treasurer, had received information from Larry Kettlewell, chief information security officer, Kansas state government, saying to not open or respond to the e-mail.

The e-mail contains the following link: hxxp://www.tax. state-XX.us/refunds/form; where XX can be any two letter U.S. state abbreviation. The site is using fast flux techniques to keep the destination hidden and prevent blocking.
