City publishes change to traffic ordinance

Kansas, Thursday, February 4, 2010. (5) ORDINANCE NO. 320

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING OR-DINANCE 313, WHICH ADOPTED BY REFERENCE THE "STANDARD TRAF-FIC ORDINANCE FOR KANSAS CIT-IES, EDITION 2007" BY DELETING SECTIONS 114.1 AND 114.2 AND AU-THORIZING, UNDER CERTAIN CONDI-TIONS, THE OPERATION OF SPECIAL PURPOSE VEHICLES ON CERTAIN STREETS WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF BIRD CITY, KANSAS; PROVIDING FOR RELATED MATTERS INCLUDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF AND REPEALING ORDINANCE 314.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERN-ING BODY OF THE CITY OF BIRD CITY, KANSAS, that sections 114.1 and 114.2 of the Standard Traffic Ordinance for Kansas Cities as adopted by reference pursuant to Ordinance 313 be deleted and the following be adopted:

Section 1. OPERATION OF SPECIAL PURPOSE VEHICLES; PEN-

(a) Special purpose vehicles may be operated upon the public highways, streets, roads, and alleys within the corporate limits of the city between sunrise and 10 p.m., provided however, no special purpose vehicle may be operated on any federal or state highway. Nothing in this subsection shall prohibit a special purpose vehicle from crossing a federal or state highway.

(b) No work-site utility vehicle or micro utility truck shall be operated on any public highway, street, road, or alley unless such vehicle shall comply with the equipment requirements under the provisions of article 17, chapter 8 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated.

(c) No all-terrain vehicle shall be operated on any public highway, street, road, to prevent excessive or unusual noise.

> (d) No golf cart shall be operated on any public highway, street, road, or alley after sunset.

> (e) No work-site utility vehicle or golf cart shall be operated on any public highway, street, road, or alley within the corporate limits of the city unless such vehicle displays a slow moving vehicle emblem on the rear of the vehicle. The slowmoving vehicle emblem shall be mounted and displayed in compliance with K.S.A. 8-1717, and amendments thereto.

> (f) No person shall operate a micro utility truck, golf cart, work-site utility vehicle or all-terrain vehicles on any public highway, street, road or alley within the corporate limits of the city unless such person has a valid driver's license.

> (g) No person under the age of 18 years shall operate or ride upon a worksite utility vehicle or an all-terrain vehicle unless wearing a helmet which complies with minimum guidelines established by the national highway traffic safety administration pursuant to the national traffic and motor vehicle safety act of 1966 for helmets designed for use by motorcyclists and other motor vehicle users, along with applicable eye protection.

(h) A violation of this section shall be deemed an ordinance traffic infraction. Upon an entry of a plea of guilty or no contest or upon being convicted of such violation, the penalty imposed shall be in accordance with current Standard Traffic Ordinance, in effect at the time of the violation, or such other similar provision as the city may then have in effect.

(g) Special purpose vehicles shall not be operated at a speed in excess of 20

(h) All special purpose vehicles shall be equipped, maintained and operated so as

(i) All laws, ordinances and other rules of the road that are applicable to the operator or occupant of a motor vehicle within the city limits are also applicable to operators and riders of special purpose

Section 2. SAME. DEFINITIONS.

(a) "Work-site utility vehicle" means any motor vehicle which is not less than 48 inches in width, has an overall length including the bumper, of not more than 135 inches, has an unladen weight, including fuel and fluids, of more than 800 pounds and is equipped with four or more low pressure tires, a steering wheel, and bench or bucket type seating allowing at least two people to sit side-by-side, and may be equipped with a bed or cargo box for hauling materials.

(b) "All-terrain vehicle" means any motorized non-highway vehicle 50 inches or less in width, having a dry weight of 1,500 pounds or less, traveling on three or more low pressure tires, and having a seat to be straddled by the operator. As used in this subsection, "low pressure tire" means any pneumatic tire six inches or more in width, designed for use on wheels with rim diameter of 14 inches or less, and utilizing an operating pressure of 10 pounds per square inch or less as recommended by the vehicle manufacturer.

(c) "Golf cart" means a motor vehicle that has not less than three wheels in contact with the ground, an unladen weight of not more than 1,800 pounds, is designed to be operated at not more than 25 miles per hour and is designed to carry not more than four persons, including the driver.

(d) "Micro utility truck" means any motor vehicle which is not less than 48 inches in width, has an overall length, including the bumper, of not more than 160 inches, has an unladenweight, including fuel and fluids, of more than 1,500 pounds, can exceed 40 miles per hour as originally manufactured and is manufactured with a metal cab. "Micro utility truck" does not include a work-site utility vehicle.

(e) "Slow-moving vehicle emblem" has the same meaning as contained in K.S.A. 8-1717, and amendments thereto.

(f) "Special purpose vehicle" means all-terrain vehicle, golf cart, micro utility truck and work-site utility vehicle, either individually or collectively.

Section 3. SAME; INSURANCE RE-QUIRED; PENALTY.

(a) Every owner of a special purpose vehicle shall provide liability coverage in accordance with Section 200 of the 2007 Standard Traffic Ordinance, and amendments thereto, and the Kansas Automobile Injury Reparations Act, K.S.A. 40–3101, et seq., and amendments thereto.

(b) All provisions of Section 200 of the 2007 Standard Traffic Ordinance, and amendments thereto, including penalty provisions, shall be applicable to all owners and operators of special purpose ve-

Section 4. REPEALER. Ordinance No. 314 amending Sections 114.1 and 114.2 of the 2007 Standard Traffic Ordinance, as adopted in Ordinance No. 313 is hereby repealed.

Section 5. PUBLICATION; EFFECTIVE DATE: This ordinance shall be published one time in the official city newspaper, The Bird City Times and shall take effect and be in force from and after said publica-
