

Society to award \$500 scholarship

The Cheyenne County Historical Society will award a \$500 scholarship to one graduating senior in order to encourage his or her further education and interest in local history.

Applicants must meet four criteria: be a Cheyenne County resident; have a cumulative gradepoint average of at least 2.0 at high school graduation; plan to attend a college, university, or vocation-technical school; and in good standing at the school atsubmit an application and essay in tended. This money can be used a large, brown envelope by March 31 to Ward Cassidy at St. Francis Community High School or Anita Burton at Cheylin High School.

Application forms are available from Mr. Cassidy or Mrs. Burton. St. Francis students should be aware that the common application form they usually complete used by the Historical Society's Scholarship Committee because they chose to use a form that would be equitable for both St. Rossbach at 332-8903. Francis and Bird City students.

An essay of 250-300 words should address why it is important to know the history of Cheyenne County. The applicant should not put his or her name on the essay itself because the judges wish to be impartial.

The scholarship recipient will be awarded \$250 in August and \$250 in January 2011, as long as he or she maintains at least a 2.0 grade-point average and remains to help buy some texts or pay some tuition or room and board.

This is the fourth year the Cheyenne County Historical Society is offering this scholarship. The first year the amount was \$250, and Brittany Lucas was the recipient. The following year the society voted to raise the amount for local scholarships will not be to \$500, and Jenice Hartman and Elizabeth Gienger were the subsequent recipients.
