

Pool Committee proposes 2010 budget

When the Bird City City Council took over operations and maintenance of the public swimming pool in 2009, they formed a pool committee to report to the council on items such as budget, repairs, supplies and staff.

The Pool Committee members appointed were Rod Klepper, Jane Young and councilman, Wade Carmichael.

The Committee presented a proposed 2010 operations budget during the city council's April meeting. Also present was Ann Burr, pool manager.

Beginning with last year's payroll, Councilman Carmichael said it was \$12,500, and this year they expect payroll will be \$14,000. Utilities were \$5,953.

He then went on to discuss facility improvements that needed to be repaired, replaced, or newly constructed. One of the most important items to replace this year is the water line row of tile across the top wall of the pool that had been removed.

He explained that Brad Schneider, city superintendent, told him that the row of tile served a purpose, and it is important to have those tiles there to prevent erosion to the pool wall and around the pool skimmers.

Councilman Carmichael said that another important item that needed to be considered would be putting tiles on the top of the pool stairs, both projects estimated cost of \$2,826. However, he said the tiling of the pool steps was not as important as the water line tile re-

placement and could wait.

In the restrooms, the sinks, toilets, and fixtures were guessed to be some of the original equipment and should be replaced sometime in the future and estimated cost was \$2,500.

Other items discussed were replacing privacy curtains in the women's bathroom; clean, repaint with acrylic, and seal pool house floors; add shade around pool area; replace skimmer, and repair the pool ladders that were loose.

Phyllis Carson, city treasurer, was on hand to discuss funds that were available and what had been budgeted during the budget meeting last summer. She said that the budget for 2010 swim season was set at \$30,000.

Mr. Klepper mentioned that in

on the pool was minimal, this was to just get the pool opened. He said because of that, it is time to put money into equipment and pool repair. The next question he wanted to know was how much money the council would allow for the repairs and maintenance.

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Mrs. Carson said last year's expenses and purchases came to \$25,400. Also the costs of the family seasonal pass would increase to \$125, and the single pass to \$75, and private parties \$75.

It was agreed that repairs should begin and each year a new project would be completed. This year the repairs that will take place are the water line row of tile, repair the ladders, and paint the pool house floors with a budget of \$5,000.

Fred was one of those unique individuals that most people knew by name or maybe knew him as drove down the road in his old Ford pickup with the window down so, with a big smile, he could wave at everyone.
