Cougar track team reaches league meet

High School Track Team Competes Well at League

On Friday, May 14, the Cheylin High School track teams traveled to Scott City to compete in the Western Kansas Liberty League league track meet. Two Cougars and one Lady Cougar brought home first-place finishes.

Jared Cahoj was the champion of the boys' long jump with a jump of 19-1/4; Chris Walden won the boys' 300-meter hurdles with a time of 45.02 seconds; and Forrest Burr took first place in the girls' shot put with a throw of 32 feet, 7 inches.

As a team, the men scored 69 points, tying with Golden Plains for fourth place. The ladies, with a team of four, scored 29 points and placed seventh overall.

Coach Max Keltz said he was proud of how the athletes competed; he looked forward to watching them at regionals, and hopefully going to state.

Come out and support the team next Friday as they head to Hays for the regional track meet, starting at 3 p.m.

Wheat plot tours are scheduled

The Cheyenne County wheat plot tour will be held at 5:30 p.m. on Wed., June 16 at the wheat plots at Sunny Crest Farm south of Wheeler on K-27, then west on Rd. J. Also at 5:30, there will be a "bread" demonstration at Goodland Greenline, Wheeler. Everyone is welcome and it will be something that people who are not going to the wheat plot might like to attend.

"These plots give growers and others interested in wheat production the chance to see different varieties and how those varieties are faring under local conditions," said Jim Shroyer, Extension wheat specialist.

The plots represent months of work by Extension agents and cooperators in their counties and districts, he said. Producers often check the plots throughout the growing season.

Wind power being considered in area

Giant wind mills are appearing more frequently across the county and, with Kansas' winds, especially in Cheyenne County, it seems like this would be an ideal place for the wind farms.

Chuck Kribs, Cheyenne County Development coordinator, said he had three or four calls from wind energy contractors who were interested in putting towers in this part of the country.

Sometime ago, he said, there was an announcement to put together a program for a high-voltage transmission link but, not very close to Cheyenne County as it follows I-70.

We need to stay on top of the project, Mr. Kribs said. We need to see what it will take to put a leg in this part of the county if we want wind energy.

"If we had a transmission line and, if a transmission company wanted to put a wind farm in the county, it would be a good thing," Mr. Kribs said.

I have a gut feeling, he said, that the county that holds out the most pay inducement will get the farms. The transmission links will probably not be built until 2013 or 2014. This could give time to collect money for wind energy.

Actually, he said, the bottom line is, if we get transmission lines, the wind farms will follow.

Dave Flemming, road and bridge supervisor, had been at a meeting and felt there was two sides to wind farms -- that when a wind farm was put up, there would probably be some people staying in motels and eating in restaurants, but the companies brings their own concrete plant, their own equipment, and when they are done within a couple of months, there are only two or three jobs in the county.

It was pointed out that two or three jobs are two or three jobs that the county doesn't have now. Plus, the farmers, whose land is leased to put up the wind farms, would have more money.

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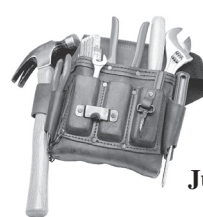
