### Airport authority president discusses grant details

Commission met with the Cheyenne County Commissioners on Tuesday, Aug. 31.

Dave Yost, president, updated the commissioners on what is going on with the airport. He said the grant for the runway extension became available several days before the expiration of the grant requirements. Mr. Yost had scanned and e-mailed it then filled out the originals and sent it FedEx. The grant design has been approved as well as the agreement with Olsson Associates, the engineering firm for the airport improvements. The runway, the commissioners said, is a commitment to the community. Once it is extended, the commissioners agreed that it would be a fantastic airport.

Once the airport runway is completed, it will be approximately a \$2 million project with the county paying only 5 percent or \$100,000.

The airport extension is being paid for with a 95/5 grant where the federal government pays for 95

other 5 percent. Work is expected to January, April and July.

# Residents urged to save landfill by recycling items

Saving the county landfill was a concern of the Cheyenne County Commissioners when they met Tuesday, Aug. 31. They stressed the importance of recycling everything possible.

Dave Flemming, road and bridge supervisor, passed on a question from Ed Garner, landfill supervisor. Was he supposed to continue to allow the Bird City cleanup project to continue dumping without a charge?

Earlier, the city of Bird City had received permission from the commissioners to allow free dumping from a city cleanup of a lumberyard but, to be free, the materials needed to be separated so part of it could be burned. However, the landfill supervisor said there was not the proper separation.

The next round of cleanup is here. There are five houses being demolished and there were only supposed to be two. After much discussion, the commissioners agreed to waive the fees only if the materials were properly separated. Terry Miller, clerk, said he would contact Cathy Domsch, Century II executive director, to let her know of the conditions.

This is an expense to every taxpayer in Cheyenne County, said Dale Patton, commissioner.

Keeping the landfill from filling up so fast is important. It is very expensive to transport so people need to recycle, the commissioners warned. They discussed raising the fees at the landfill but, wondered if people would just find someplace else to put their trash, thus making a bigger problem.

If another hail storm hits the county, Andy Beikman, commissioner, said, the landfill will fill up that much faster. There were tons of shingles put in the landfill last

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
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
