

Vaccination clinic scheduled in Sainty Friday, Oct. 1

There will be a seasonal Influenza Vaccination Clinic scheduled for Friday, Oct. 1, at the Cheyenne County Health Department. This clinic will run from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. No appointment is needed for this flu clinic.

The clinic is located in the basement of the Cheyenne County Clinic. People may take the elevator to the basement floor or use the stairway to the basement flu clinic.

Why get vaccinated? The flu is a contagious disease caused by the influenza virus. It can be spread by coughing, sneezing, or nasal secretions.

Infants, the elderly, pregnant women, and people with certain health conditions...such as heart, lung, kidney disease or a weakened immune system are at highest risk for the influenza virus and can get much sicker. Flu can cause high fever and pneumonia, and make existing medical conditions worse.

The 2010-2011 influenza

vaccine will protect against an influenza A H3N2 virus, an influenza B virus and the 2009 H1N1 virus. By getting vaccinated you can protect yourself from influenza and may also avoid spreading influenza to others. It takes up to two weeks for protection to develop after the shot. Your protection with the vaccine should last about one year.

All people 6 months of age and older are highly recommended to get vaccinated against the flu virus. Vaccination is especially important for people at higher risk of severe influenza and their close contacts, including healthcare personnel and close contacts of children younger than 6 months of age.

There are two types of influenza vaccine: The first one is an inactivated (killed) vaccine given by a needle injection into the muscle. The second is a live, attenuated (weakened) influenza vaccine. This one is sprayed into the nostrils. The Center for

Disease Control (CDC) highly recommend the people who got the 2009 H1N1 (pandemic) influenza should still get the 2010-2011 seasonal flu vaccine.

The Center for Disease Control states that the risk of a vaccine causing serious harm, or death, is extremely small. Serious problems from inactivated influenza vaccine are very rare. Mild problems with the vaccine include: soreness, redness, or swelling where the shot was given; fever; aches. If these problems occur, they usually begin soon after the shot and last 1-2 days.

People with an egg allergy should not get the vaccine. If you had a severe reaction after a dose of influenza vaccine, or had Guillain Barre Syndrome ask your medical provider prior to getting a flu shot. Your medical provider will help you decide whether the vaccine is recommended for you.

Cheyenne County will hold a Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day on **Saturday, Sept. 18 from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m.** at the Cheyenne County Landfill.
Materials accepted include paints, solvents, cleaners, pesticides, aerosol cans, batteries and used oil. Automobile lead acid batteries will be accepted. Please have the materials in sturdy boxes for easy and quick unloading. Have your used oil in disposable containers. Farm chemicals, appliances, tires, yard waste, explosives, school lab chemicals, medical waste, radioactive waste, ammo, compressed gas cylinders (propane), asbestos, dioxins or silvex will not be accepted. Program organizers reserve the right to reject delivery of materials.
Participants are asked to leave all materials in their original containers. If the container is leaking, pack the container "as is" in another larger container and label it clearly. If another container is used, be sure it is clearly labeled. Do not mix contents of different containers. Securely package materials before transporting. Do not carry open containers of liquids with strong odors or spill potential in a closed automobile. Pack the containers so they won't tip, break or spill during travel. Waste oil should not contain gasoline, solvents, decreases, paint or antifreeze. Keep all household hazardous waste away from children and animals.
Due to KDHE regulations these are items that can't be picked up during the City-Wide Cleanup later in the month. You do not need to call prior to bringing items to the Landfill. If you have questions, please call the Landfill at 785-332-8842, Tuesday through Saturday.
No Household Hazardous Waste items accepted early or after the clean up date.
