ORDINANCE NUMBER 322

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING PUBLIC OFFENSES WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF BIRD CITY, KANSAS, INCORPORATED BY REFERENCE THE "UNIFORM PUBLIC OFFENSE CODE FOR KANSAS CITIES," EDITION 2010; WITH CERTAIN ADDITIONS AND REPEALING ORDINANCE NUMBER 312.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF BIRD CITY, KANSAS:

SECTION 1. INCORPORATING UNIFORM PUBLIC OFFENSE CODE. There is hereby incorporated by reference for the purpose of regulating public offenses within the corporate limits of the City of Bird City, Kansas, that certain code known as the "Uniform Public Offense Code," Edition of 2010, prepared and published in book form by the League of Kansas Municipalities, Topeka, Kansas, save and except such articles, sections, parts or portions as are hereafter omitted, deleted, modified or changed. No fewer than three copies of said Uniform Public Offense Code shall be marked or stamped "Official Copy as Incorporated by the Code of the City of Bird City, Kansas," with all sections or portions thereof intended to be omitted or changed clearly marked to show any such omission or change and to which shall be attached a copy of this ordinance, and filed with the city clerk to be open to inspection and available to the public at all reasonable hours.

SECTION 2. AMENDING BIRD CITY CODE. Section 12-102 of the Bird City Code, as adopted by Ordinance Number 270, is hereby amended to read as follows:

SECTION 12-102. INCORPORATING UNIFORM PUBLIC OFFENSE CODE. There is hereby incorporated by reference for the purpose of regulating public offenses within the corporate limits of the City of Bird City, Kansas, that certain code known as the "Uniform Public Offense Code," Edition of 2010, prepared and published in book form by the League of Kansas Municipalities, Topeka, Kansas, save and except such articles, sections, parts or portions as are hereafter omitted, deleted, modified or changed. No fewer than three copies of said Uniform Public Offense Code shall be marked or stamped "Official Copy as Incorporated by the Code of the City of Bird City, Kansas," with all sections or portions thereof intended to be omitted or changed clearly marked to show any such omission or change and to which shall be attached a copy of this ordinance, and filed with the city clerk to be open to inspection and available to the public at all reasonable hours.

SECTION 3. REPEAL. Ordinance Number 312 and all other ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance.

SECTION 4. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the publication in the official city newspaper.

A historical trail along with other historical sites, including The Arickaree Breaks, will be featured. Placards are being designed and there will be some that can be picked up and taken with tourists as they travel the county.

There is a travel agency, Mr. Kribs said, that is interested in bringing people to see The Breaks as well as events such as wheat harvest. People on the front range, he said, have no clue what harvest involves. There is also talk of bike tours.

Geocaching is a popular event. A geocaching site will be created in The Breaks and those finding it will bring back a medallion or a coupon for a business in St. Francis/Bird City.

The object of the plans, he said, is to bring tourists off the highway, into town and then show tourists the sites and history of Cheyenne County, eventually leading them back to town.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 323

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING TRAFFIC WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF BIRD CITY, KANSAS, INCORPORATED BY REFERENCE THE STAN-DARD TRAFFIC ORDINANCE CODE FOR KANSAS CITIES," EDITION 2010; WITH CERTAIN ADDITIONS AND REPEALING ORDINANCE NUMBER 313.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF BIRD CITY, KANSAS:

SECTION 1. INCORPORATING STANDARD TRAFFIC ORDINANCE. There is hereby incorporated by reference for the purpose of regulating traffic within the corporate limits of the City of City of Bird City, Kansas, that certain standard traffic ordinance known as the "Standard Traffic Ordinance for Kansas Cities," Edition of 2010, prepared and published in book form by the League of Kansas Municipalities, save and except such articles, sections, parts or portions as are hereafter omitted, deleted, modified or changed, such incorporation being authorized by K.S.A. 12-3009 through 12-3012, inclusive, as amended. No fewer than three copies of said standard ordinance shall be marked or stamped "Official Copy as Incorporated by the Code of the City of Bird City, Kansas," with all sections or portions thereof intended to be omitted or changed clearly marked to show any such omission or change and to which shall be attached a copy of this ordinance, and filed with the city clerk to be open to inspection and available to the public at all reasonable hours.

SECTION 2. SAME; TRAFFIC INFRACTIONS AND TRAFFIC OFFENSES.

(a) An ordinance traffic infraction is a violation of any section of this ordinance that prescribes or requires the same behavior as that prescribed or required by a statutory provision that is classified as a traffic infraction in K.S.A. Supp. 8-2118.

(b) All traffic violations which are included within this ordinance, and which are not ordinance traffic infractions as defined in subsection (a) of this ordinance, shall be considered traffic offenses.

SECTION 3. PENALTY FOR SCHEDULED FINES. The fine for violation of an ordinance traffic infraction or any other traffic offense for which the municipal judge establishes a fine in a fine schedule shall not be less than \$10 nor more than \$30, except for speeding which shall not be less than \$10 nor more than \$500. A person tried and convicted for violation of an ordinance traffic infraction or other traffic offense for which a fine has been established in a schedule of fines shall pay a fine fixed by the court not to exceed \$500

SECTION 4. SECTIONS STRICKEN FROM STANDARD TRAFFIC ORDINANCE. Sections 114.1, 114.2, 114.4 and 114.5 of the "Standard Traffic Ordinance for Kansas Cities," Edition of 2010 shall be stricken.

SECTION 5. REPEAL. Ordinance Number 312 and all other ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance, except Ordinance Number 320 which shall remain in effect.

SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the publication in the official city newspaper.


