scmccormick@nwkansas.com While everyone is geared up for an exciting Christmas holiday, it is also the perfect time of year to reflect on an American hero. Personally, I believe it's always time to remember the men and women who have allowed us the freedom to worship and celebrate as we wish.

For baseball fans, most know of the great Cleveland Indian's pitcher Bob Feller. Over 18 seasons he threw three no-hitters and 12 one-hitters with a career ERA of 3.25.

What most might not know is that Feller was one of many who fight in World War II.

Feller was considered the best pitcher in the majors when the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor. Two days later he walked into a Navy recruiting office to enlist.

Although he could have spent his naval career teaching physical training and competing on Navy baseball teams, Feller wanted to be in the action. He transferred to Naval Gunnery School, graduated Dec. 15, at the age of 92. and was placed on the USS Alabama.

A South Dakota class battle ship, the Alabama first saw action in the

north Atlantic before being sent to the Pacific Theater. The ship took part in almost every major naval engagement there.

Feller commanded an antiaircraft crew during amphibious assaults on New Guinea, Guam, Kwajalein and Peleliu. His men played an important roll defending the Alabama against kamikaze attacks during the campaigns of the Philippines and Okinawa.

He was discharged in the summer of 1945 with the rank of chief petty officer and received all three of the military's campaign medals as well as eight bronze

After retiring from baseball, volunteered to leave pro sports to Feller was asked if he ever regretted the decision to serve rather than add to his baseball numbers.

"I have no regrets," Feller said. "The only win I wanted was to win World War II. This country is what it is today because of our victory in that war."

What beautiful words from a true American patriot.
