"So we're a slow-growing company," she said.



Ralph Eugene Smith, age 88, died on Friday morning, Jan. 28, 2011, at the Colorow Care Center with this family by his side.

Ralph enlisted with the Army Air Corps in 1942 and was asked to train as a gunner due to his excellent marksmanship. After this training, he became a tail gunner on B-24s, later moving to Mildred Headrick in Salinas, (Larry) Franks of Olathe, as well the nose turret during World War Calif. He received the Air Medal and 37 years of marriage before her distinguished Flying Cross for extra-ordinary achievement by participating in combat missions totaling more than 200 hours during his three year deployment, during which exposure to enemy fire was probable and expected. 


