Legislative News By Ward Cassidy, 120th State Representative

Topeka this week. My work with the fire marshal office will save several million dollars in needless spending for nursing homes, schools, and older buildings in the state.

The previous fire marshal administration overlooked the exception to the law and "over enforced" the new fire codes. They were issuing numerous citations that were unwarranted.

The acting fire marshal, Doug Jorgenson, has agreed to have his office review all citations issued to school districts during the last 18 months. The unfunded mandates were not necessary because the buildings were not dangerous.

The continued big news in Topeka is the census results. No surprise that Johnson County recorded the largest growth in the state. They already have 20 more representatives than all of western Kansas. Fifty Kansas counties have lost doubledigit population numbers in the last 10 years. We can only hope that the Governor's Rural Opportunity Zone program will develop some growth for Northwest Kansas. Fifty Kansas counties qualify for the program and all of the 120th is included.

Here is the decline of population in the 120th District the last 10 years: Cheyenne lost 439 people, Rawlins lost 447, Decatur lost 511, Norton lost 282, and Phillips lost 359. My website has all of the Kansas census data.

A bill that again exemplifies the Governor's desire to rid the state of wasteful spending is SB 193. This bill would require a valid social security number to be given to qualify for the state food sales tax rebate. The Department of Revenue has been accepting 9,000 plus rebate forms without a social security number. The bill will save \$2.4 million. (Another example of wasteful spending). Hopefully, we can find

money.

A lingering problem is this current year's budget. Discussions to reconcile the Governor's rescission bill have come to a halt as the House and Senate conferees cannot find common ground on the maintenance of effort issue concerning special education. The deadlock could result in the Governor's office making allotments or cuts in order to achieve a balanced budget this

The voter identification bill needs clarification and the way I understand it now is that all voters will have to show photo identification at the polls. Documentation includes college identification cards, current driver's licenses and expired driver licenses for voters over 65 years of age. I am in favor of this bill.


A bill coming forward that has a great deal of interest to any Kansas Public Employees Retirement System (KPERS) employee is HB 2333. There were many ideas that had many people wondering where this bill was headed. Here is the synopsis: couple KPERS normal retirement age to social security full retirement age beginning July 1, 2016. 1) Eliminate the 85 point

I had a major accomplishment in many more areas to save the state rule, while early retirement remains unchanged. Correction workers, police, and firemen are not affected. 2) Increase the cap on employer contributions from .6 percent a year to .8 percent starting in fiscal year 2013. 3) Change the multiplier for future service from 1.75 to 1.4 beginning in fiscal year 2013 and beyond; 4) Direct the net proceeds from the sale of any state property to the KPERS unfunded liability, starting fiscal year 2013.

I would again remind people that anything you hear about being proposed still has to get 63 votes in the House, 21 votes in the Senate, and the Governor's signature.

The most talked about vote in the legislature this week was the Community Defense Act, HB 2107. It passed 91-28. The bill regulates sexually oriented businesses (SOBs) - interesting acronym. I voted for

In compliance with the provisions of K.S.A. 25-2310 notice is hereby given that the books for registration of voters will be open during regular business hours at the offices of the County Clerk in St. Francis and at the City Clerk in Bird City.

A citizen of the United States who is eighteen (18) years of age and upwards, or will have attained the age of eighteen (18) years at the next election may register to vote. At issue was Kansas State Fire Marshall's Office enforcement of fire codes on older buildings. Kansas statute provides older buildings not in strict compliance could remain in service so long as the buildings were not determined to be "a distinct hazard to life and property (KSA 31-133 c.)"

Rep. Cassidy said the previous Kansas State Fire Marshall's Office administration overlooked that exception to the law and "over enforced" the new fire codes issuing numerous citations to schools, nursing homes and other businesses located in older buildings.

"This was an important fix. We have schools and local businesses already struggling to make ends meet, and these interpretations make that difficult," Rep. Cassidy said. "Trying to retrofit an older building to meet the new codes
