> Mayor Burr said he would prefer to have specific arrangements made in writing between City Council continue providing salt and asphalt in exchange for maintaining the ditches along U.S. 36. Mayor Burr directed Councilman Serrano to visit with Mr. Lee to find out if he will be willing to sign a written agreement with the city.

> > **Training classes**

Mr. Schneider requester permission to attend a one-day training class being offered by the Kansas Rural Water Association in Wakeeney, on Aug. 16. This class will cover the topics of line locators, leak detection, proper use and care of equipment, water loss accountability, conducting water loss surveys, and meter testing for large and small meters.
