To Welcome Spring With Color, Plant Bulbs Now

October is the time for planting smaller bulbs go just 1- to-2 inches the spring-flowering bulbs that will produce striking, bright colors early next season. Daffodils, tulips and the like need to be planted in fall so they can develop roots and then go through the chilling period they need to bloom.

Ward Upham, horticulturalist with K-State Research and Extension, recommends planting in full sun to partial shade – if possible, in an area with 12-inch-deep sandy loam soil.

"But even poor soils can work if you mix in an organic material such as peat moss, compost or aged bark," he said.

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
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
