The Family, Community and Education - Kanred club met on Oct. 10 at the Bird City Senior Center. There were five members present: Dorothy Mast, Colleen Catic, LeeAnna Wendell, Treva Henry and Wanda Dowdy.

Treva gave the lesson which was entitled "Someone's in the Supermarket...buying safe food." She began the lesson by reminding us about the Rocky Ford cantaloupe that were contaminated this year and what a scare that was to each of us who enjoy eating cantaloupe. One of the most important things that we can do each time we buy fresh fruits and vegetables is to wash them thoroughly, especially outside.

You can choose to buy foods that have been electronically pasteurized or irradiated. This process reduces or eliminates disease-causing germs and keeps food nutritionally unchanged. Look for a green and white symbol of irradiation when you're shopping for safe foods. This symbol is known as "radura" and is used internationally. It is colored green on a white background, showing two leaves resting in a semicircle with a green dot above it.

Here are some basic things to remember for preparing foods safely:

- Wash hands thoroughly before and after touching meats, fresh vegetables and/or fruit.
- Clean kitchen counters regularly with soap, bleach or antibacterial agent, and always

clean after meats have been on counter.

- Never use the same towel to wipe off counters as you use to dry dishes.

- Never put cooked hamburger on the same plate on which you had raw meat.

- Never use the same knife for meat and vegetables or fruit.

- Never use a knife to scrape small pieces of food from a cutting board into a food dish you are preparing.

- Always store raw chicken and meat on the bottom shelf of the refrigerator.

- Always cook hamburger until internal temperature is 160 degrees.

- Always wash fruits and vegetables under running water before refrigerating or serving them.

- Always refrigerate cooked foods immediately after serving. Always refrigerate salads, especially those containing mayonnaise, both before and after serving.

- You can help to prevent someone in your family from getting a food-borne illness if you always remember these tips.
