The recycle center, by the water tower, was loaded down with items that are not recyclable.

The recycle center is not a dump, said Mr. Schneider. It doesn't take garbage, e-waste materials (microwaves and other electrical appliances), nor does it take building material and junk.

The center has bins designated for the different items — cans, plastics, cardboard and glass. The bins are labeled and if there is no bin for whatever people bring, then don't leave it.

Recycling is now and in the future. It saves the landfill from filling up so quickly. When there is no more room at the county dump, then it will be necessary to transport it to a landfill center in another county. It will cost county residents considerably more than they are paying today.
