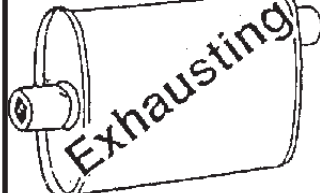

# Fire department to get water truck

 The Cheyenne County Fire Department is getting a truck to haul the water tank and it is going to not cost the county anything for the actual truck.

Commissioner Andy Beikman said George Harper, fire chief, had found a truck that the Kansas Forestry Service was going to give away. The service had six trucks and Chief Harper was able to contact the service, getting the last truck.

Dave Flemming, county road and bridge department supervisor, was going to Manhattan and will look at it. If it is in good shape, he will bring it home.

While the truck is free, it is painted camouflaged so will need to be repainted. Mr. Harper had talked to Hays Fire and Equipment about putting on the tank and they had given a bid of \$60,000.

Mr. Beikman figured that the county crew and firemen can put on a 20,000 gallon tank and do the plumbing for about \$20,000.

**Treasurer's office closed**  
 Dolores Jenik, county treasurer, said her office will be closed to vehicle business from May 1 through 7 while the state converts to a new system for titling and registering vehicles. The office will also be unable to renew driver licenses and identification cards from May 1 through 6.

The commissioners agreed that she should put a public notice in the newspapers as well as make

door signs.  
**Safe Route Grant**  
 Cathy Domsch, Century II director, and Rod Klepper, Bird City, explained the Safe Route Grant. The city of Bird City is applying for the grant and, approved, will provide \$250,000 to run concrete sidewalks in the city.

It is a simple program but very competitive, Mr. Klepper said. Because we are a small community, he said, the Kansas Department does a lot of the engineering and, there is no matching funds needed.

The commissioners agreed to send a letter of endorsement for the Safe Route Grant for Bird City.

• The Neighborhood Revitalization-Tax Rebate Program. The Bird City Mayor, and Cheylin Superintendent said both the city council and the school board had thought it was a good idea and had signed up, as did the city of St. Francis. The commissioners also thought it was a good program and agreed to enroll. That leaves the St. Francis Board of Education not enrolling and they will make the final decision at their May meeting.

# Many fish caught in contest

A couple of months ago, the Cheyenne County Wildlife organization had around 400 pounds of rainbow trout dumped in Keller's Pond. Over the weekend, two fishing contests were held and anglers caught around one-third of the trout.

The weather was beautiful for the kids' fishing tournament held on Saturday. No coats were needed and there were even a few with their shoes off, wading in the chilly water.

In all, there were 44 kids with their fishing poles lining the edge of the pond. Some were young enough that parents were accompanying them.

Catching the largest fish was Justin Pacheo. The fish measured 23-inches long. Catching the most fish was Kyler Zwegardt with eight fish.

Following the contest, the Wildlife members served hamburgers, beans and chips. Helping with the food were Williams Grocery of Atwood, Sainty Liquor and Laura Lamb.

The contest held on Sunday took some dedicated fishermen to withstand the 55 mile-per-hour wind and cold temperatures accompanied by occasional rain. Most were hunkered down in coats and raincoats. By 10:30, only a handful remained.

However, Dr. Melvin Dunn, who had his grandson fishing with him, said "it is fun!"

On Sunday, there were 18 teams of two fishermen. Winning the contest were the Sturgeon broth-

ers, Isaac and Trevor, who reeled in 24.75 pounds of trout.

Second place went to the team of D.J. and Ben Killingsworth with 11.75 pounds of trout. Dr. Dunn and Jude Faulkender brought in 11.5 pounds of trout, taking home third place.

There is still about 230 pounds of rainbow trout left to be fished out, said Francis O'Leary, Wild-

life member. On Sunday, one fish, alone, weighed 5 pounds. Some of the fish when put into the pond, he said, were 24-inches long.

The pond is now open to the public but those fishing will need a license (no trout stamp is required). The Wildlife organization stocks the pond with trout every year as part of its' commitment to the community.
