

Area Students receive Pete Henry Scholarships

Seniors from Cheylin High School and St. Francis Community High School are among the students who will receive one of the 180 scholarships given by the Pete Henry Foundation. This is the eighth year that the foundation is giving renewable scholarships.

This year the renewable scholarships are for \$1,500 for each semester for eight semesters. Other scholarships for \$2,500, \$2,000, \$1,500, \$1,000 and \$750 are one-time scholarships.

The Pete Henry scholarship was created through the generosity of Pete Henry who was a farmer for many years in the Brewster area. Pete had an inquiring mind and knew the value of hard work, thrift and good management.

He was born in 1910 and was raised on a farm near Campbell, Neb. His mother died when he was 13 and his immediate responsibility was to care for and manage the household for his four younger brothers and sisters while his dad struggled to earn a living. Pete left Nebraska for California when he was 21. Times were hard. He slept in cars, washed dishes for food and eventually rented a garage for \$6 a month to sleep in.

He signed on with the Civilian Conservation Corps forest service to harvest trees and build roads. The forester recognized Pete's innate engineering talent and assigned him the responsibility of being the librarian where he immersed himself in a surveying course. He became the head of the surveying crew which built many roads and fire lands in the Sierra Nevada Mountains.

Later in the 1930s, Pete was hired by Douglas Aircraft Company to work in the engineering department designing and constructing fighter planes. All of this was accomplished with only an eighth grade

education.

The 1940s found Pete in and out of the Army Air Corp where he was flight engineer of the B-17, B-24 and B-29 aircraft. He also participated in top secret training, with some of the airmen from his base being the ones that dropped the atomic bomb.

In 1949, Pete rented ground south of Brewster from former neighbors in Nebraska. Pete, always the keen observer, adapted his Nebraska farming experiences to western Kansas. He never farmed prime cultivated land; he saw each acre as unique and managed each type of soil differently to achieve maximum productivity. He watched his neighbors and learned from their successes and mistakes, managed his money frugally, investing in good machinery and income-producing assets but lived a spartan life himself. He provided essentially all the labor on the farm until he was 88-years-old and, until his death in 2002, made all the management decisions.

His dream was to assist local students to further their education. He established a foundation to award academic and technical training scholarships. If you are a self-starting, determined individual with leadership and work experience from Cheyenne, Decatur, Gove, Logan, Rawlins, Sheridan, Sherman, Thomas and Wallace counties you

are encouraged to apply.

He hoped to give others the opportunity to fulfill their dreams.

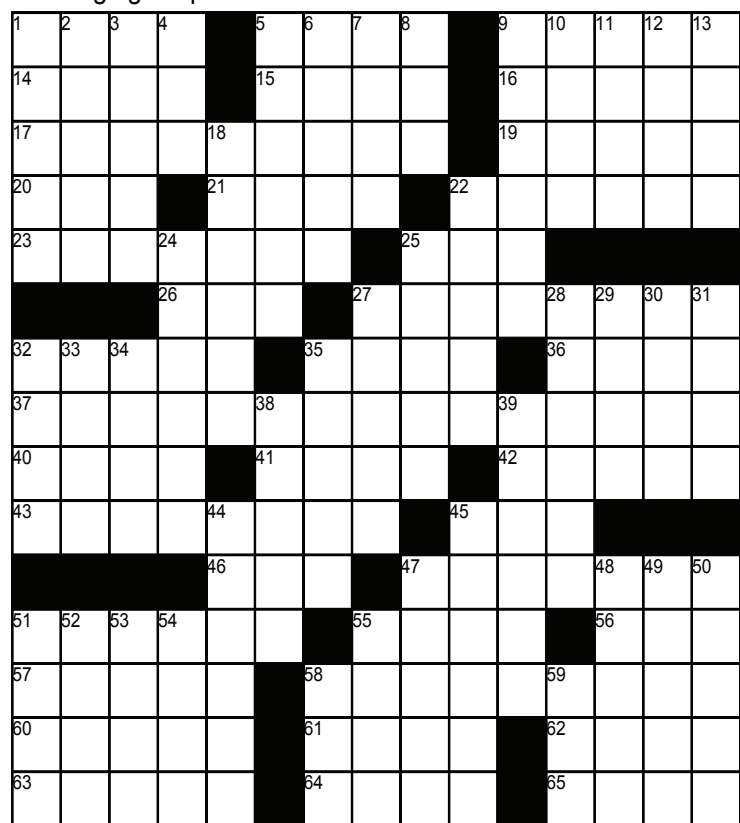

In announcing the 2012 state 4-H project award winners, Pam Van Horn noted that each of the recipients has demonstrated leadership, citizenship and personal growth during their 4-H career.

"Often, success in a 4-H project serves as an integral part of the foundation for their career choice or a lifelong interest," said Van Horn, who is a K-State Research and Extension state 4-H youth development specialist. She coordinated the awards program this year. To qualify for a state project award, a 4-H member must earn the top award in their project at the local level. The top projects are forwarded to Extension area offices in northeast, northwest, southeast, and southwest Kansas and evaluated. Finalists are then invited to interview for a state award, and the state winner is selected from among the interviewees.

The awards will be presented at the 4-H Emerald Circle Banquet, May 31, in Manhattan.

The projects are designed to explore a variety of interests, but also reflect three core competencies integrated into 4-H programs:

- * Science, engineering and technology;
- * Citizenship, leadership and service, and
- * Healthy living.

"The 2012 state project winners represent the Kansas 4-H Program at its finest," said Barbara Stone, assistant director, K-State Research and Extension, and state leader, Kansas 4-H. "The young people who have achieved this honor have set goals, made decisions and intentionally stepped up to the challenge of learning and leading in their communities."

Thirty-one 4-H members have been tapped for the 2012 state awards, which are based on work completed in 2011; the award recipients represent 14 counties and seven Extension districts.

Each of the state award recipients earns a commemorative project medallion, an invitation to National 4-H Congress, which, this year, will be held in Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 23-27. Winners also will be presented a \$400 travel scholarship from the Kansas 4-H Foundation toward expenses in attending Congress, which is a professional-development conference for youth.

A state project winner is eligible to earn the top award in a project one time, but may earn the top award in a different project during another project year. He or she is, however, only eligible to attend 4-H Congress once during his or her 4-H career.
