The national anthem was sung by Jennie Cravens and the prayer was given by Rev. Warren Cico of the United Methodist Church.

About 7 p.m. the Survivors Lap began, with two big banners being carried by Sally Priest, Linda Elfers, Bob Gross, Cindy Mitchell, Darlene Merklin and Karen DeMello. These banners told all that the survivors represented hope, and were here to fight back, celebrate, and remember.

At the end of the first lap, committee members presented each survivor with a purple carnation, donated by RoseMary Bierig, The Classic Rose floral shop. During the second lap of the park, caregivers joined their survivors.

Then followed the introduction of the many teams and their walk beginning the all-night vigil. At least one member of each team walked all night.

This year, there were new high school and junior high teams as well as family and business teams, so the enthusiasm was high.

The symbolism is that as you get cancer, and fight cancer through the long darkness, eventually you come out into the dawn, with hope for the future. Relays are held all over the United States to earn money to fight this dreaded disease.

Entertainment included singing by Mrs. Cravens and Taylor Kinzer, accompanied by Randy Smedstad.

**Evening events**  
The evening was kicked off by a community offering barbecue put on by Pam and Jim Bolin. The survivors were guests at this dinner. The Cheyenne County Shriners' Candy Wagon was there selling pop, water, popcorn, snow cones and cotton candy. The proceeds from these two vendors were donated back to the Relay.

The following morning, the wind was still blowing but had changed and was coming from the north and it was very cool. At 6:30 a.m., a church service was held in the park by Rev. Cico. A hot breakfast was provided all the teams who walked all night, and there was a great attendance of sleepy walkers. Cases of fruit were provided by Rodney Neitzel of Uptown Market.

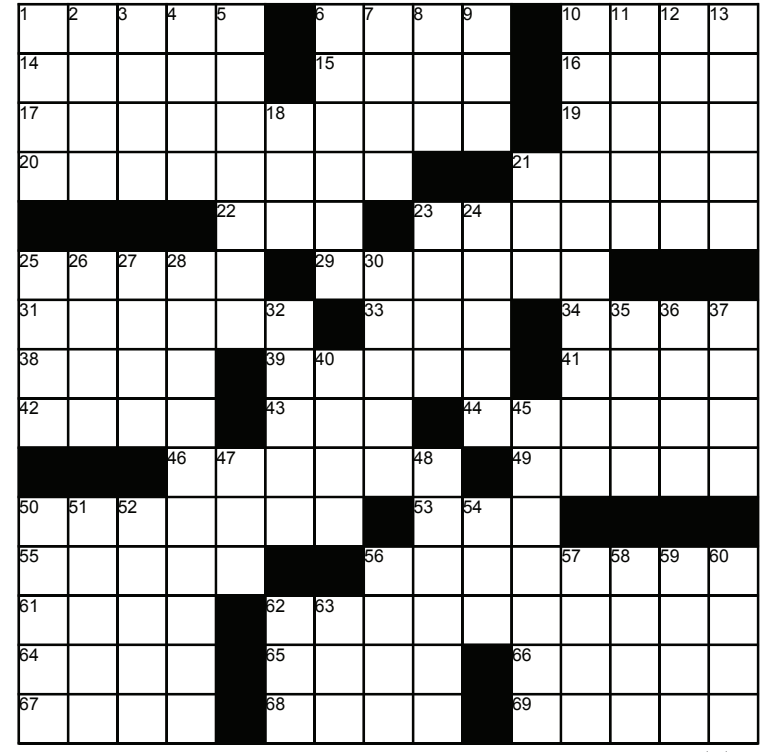
## Coach leads all-stars
