The Cheyenne County Fair begins on Monday with the 4-H Style Revue. Judging is held in the morning at Peace Lutheran Church with the style revue held at 8 p.m. in the St. Francis high school auditorium. The public is encouraged to come see the 4-H'ers as they model constructed and purchased items. See the related article elsewhere in this issue.

Wednesday through Friday, the home-owned carnival will be running from 7 to 11 p.m. On Saturday, the carnival opens at 6 p.m. and runs until midnight.

A nice areas for sitting and visiting have been established between the Methodist Church's funnel cakes stand and the Christian Church's ice cream parlor. 
