County commissioners buy compactor

By Karen Krien karen.k@nwkansas.com Chevenne County Commissioners agreed to purchase a used compactor for the landfill when they met Friday morning.

Dave Flemming, road and bridge department supervisor, had prices for a landfill compactor. The purchase of a compactor has been on the commissioners' agenda for over a month.

The compactor he thought would be the best deal for the county was a rebuilt machine costing \$165,000. The commissioners told him to make the purchase. He will look into interest rates for financing used equipment.

He said that Edwards County is selling a used pickup fitted with a spray rig. The asking price is \$12,000 to \$15,000. The commissioners decided to see if the pickup could be looked at at the next commissioners' meeting. Mr. Flemming will try to set up the meeting.


