Symptoms of foodborne illness to bacteria. vary, but usually include one or headache or fatigue. There also can be mild fever, sweating, chills, pital immediately. muscle pain, dizziness, and vision problems. Symptoms may occur as little as two hours after eating or as long as 48-72 hours after eating the contaminated food.

Although some people may have no symptoms after eating contaminated food, others may become very ill. The effect depends on the type of bacteria or toxin, how extensively the food was contaminated, how much food was eaten, and how susceptible the person is
