Upon the death of his father in 1958, he then moved his famlly into McDonald. In 1959, the family moved five miles south of McDonald. He became a member of the St. John Lutheran Church. They bought the S.C. Loker farm in 1974. In 1977, Tunney and his wife purchased a farm near Parks, Neb. Throughout these years, his children assisted him often, mostly on weekends.

Tunney sold Moews Seed Corn, Versa Ramp for easy loading and Boss Side-rolls for Irrigation. Moews dealership gave Tunney and his wife the opportunity to take enjoyable trips to Chicago, D.C., and St. Louis, Mo.

Screening held last Wednesday at hall

bc.times@nwkansas.com The new lighting at the American Legion Hall set a perfect hospital setting for the technician crew from Life Line Screening last Wednesday. Mildred Vargas the Ultrasound Technologist reported there were 32 local residents who took advantage of these tests. It was the first time screening for all but one of these participants.

The reports have to be returned to Independence, Ohio for the detailed results of these screenings that will be returned within 21 days. Sherry Le Fevre the Medical Technician was happy to report none of the participants showed any critical results. She explained, "If the technicians find any critical results showing cause for a stroke,

they need to be seen by their doctor right away or in no less than 24 hours. In the case of an abdominal aneurism measuring 3.0 they must be referred to a doctor, and at 5.0 they are considered critical and must see a doctor right away.

Life Line Screening technicians come from all over the United States and travel as a team conducting these screenings.

Since 1993, they have screened over seven million people, and currently screen over one million people each year in over 16,000 screening events nationwide. The team at Bird City consisted of two Ultrasound Technicians, and three medical technicians. After packing their vans in Bird City they were going to McCook, Neb., and then on to Norton.
