Margaret Thatcher, the first woman to become prime minister of Great Britain, has died at the age of 87. More important than that, she was the kindred spirit of Ronald Reagan who also took a tough stand on communism and, together, helped bring an end to the Cold War.

Known as "the Iron Lady," a tag she relished which actually came from the Russian Soviets, her conservative policies and determination over three terms from 1979 to 1990 helped to rebuild her country after it faltered following the Second World War.

Baroness Thatcher survived an Irish Republican Army bomb attack in 1984, which killed and injured many of her conservative colleagues at the Brighton hotel

where they gathered. Undeterred, party members who lost their clothes in the explosion were given new from a local store and the conference continued on schedule.

She also led her country during the Falkland War of 1982 when Argentina took possession of Britain's islands in the Southern Atlantic. There was no question in her mind that those locales far away should remain a part of the English Empire.

When strong labor opposition supported a year long coal miner's strike in 1978, Thatcher again was unwavering when she stated, We should back the workers and not the shirkers." The strike soon ended.

Having grown up during the Cold War years of the 1960s to 1990s I am grateful that we had the leadership of Margaret Thatcher and her friend, Ronald Reagan. Thus the curtain lowers for one

of Britain's finest.


