120th District Representative It is great to be back in Northwest Kansas after a long winter in Topeka. I will be in all my counties during the next three weeks attending different events.

The two biggest issues were not resolved prior to "turn around."

The budget and tax plan for next year have yet to be decided. The state has adopted a two-year budget plan.

The conference committees on budget and tax have to reconcile their different plans into one uniform bill. The one constitutional duty of the legislature is to pass a budget before the session ends, and a key component to the budget is tax legislation.

In the 120th district, I have not yet met, talked to, or had an email that feels the state should do away with income tax. Most people are concerned about a reduction in services and an increase in property tax.
