Camp offers business knowledge

What is an entrepreneur? What does an entrepreneur do? Do you know any entrepreneurs? Are you an entrepreneur? These are the questions the youth came to find out the answers to last week at the Entrepreneurship Camp sponsored by the Bird City Century II Development Foundation.

The first two days of camp, June 17 and 19, the fifth through eighth graders were invited to come to learn about entrepreneurship. When the camp began each camper was given a sheet of paper that had the definition of entrepreneurship on it. They were asked to think of words that described an entrepreneur. Some of the words they came up with were working, selling and saving.

Prior to the camp each camper was mailed a letter asking them to come to camp with an idea for a business they could run on the second day of camp. The campers came with big ideas for their business and after much contemplation it was decided they would sell trail mix. After making this decision they began to work on their business plans. They decided to call their

business "Tummy Yummy Trail Mix" and to sell the trail mix outside of Hometown Market. They wrote this information down as their business description. They continued writing their business plan and came up with all sorts of ways they could spread the word about their business. advertising included hanging posters and flyers around town, and telling people about their business. After making all their advertisements and deciding where to put them they went to the grocery store to buy their supplies. At the store they figured which of each ingredient they would purchase based on how much per ounce the product cost compared to other similar products. With bags full of supplies they headed back to Century II to see how much they would need to sell in order to pay back their expenses and make a little money. Their business was a success; selling two different kinds of trail mix they each made \$16, with a total profit of \$64. With such a good profit the camp ended with much excitement. Campers who attended were: Kaylynn Hendricks, Alex Dart, Andrew Schields, and Gus Hespe.

The second two days of camp, June 20 and 2,t the upcoming second through fourth graders were invited to come learn about entrepreneurship. The camp started the same way as the first with the campers writing on a

paper words that they thought over \$28. Campers who attended card, and a I love you card. All described an entrepreneur. Some of the words they came up with were work, money and business.

The group of campers was told they would have a lemonade stand. After they began their business plan they decided they would do something a little different from the average lemonade stand to put them ahead of the competition. They would make ice cubes to go in their lemonade that were made from lemonade, and colored bright colors. This would keep your drink from getting watered down by the melting ice, and as the lemonade ice melted it would turn your drink a fun color. After deciding this they choose to call their business "Crazy Colorful Lemonade" and sell their lemonade in front of Hometown Market.

They decided to advertise by hanging flyers and posters around town as well as telling their family about their business. After they made their advertisements and decided where to hang them they went to the store to get their supplies. It was a big decision to decide how much of each ingredient they would buy, since they didn't know how much they would sell. After returning from the store they figured how much they would need to sell in her love of crafts. She came to order to pay off their expenses the camp with a load of card and make a little money. When the "photo-shoot" was finished she showed them the pictures and let them see the differences in photo quality when she used different settings on her camera during the photo shoot. She also introduced them to Photoshop and showed how using it she could edit the
