

School board officers elected

The July 8 Cheylin School Board meeting was the first meeting conducted by new superintendent Shelly Angelos. With three board members, Hal Antholz, Jan Busse and George Lauderbaugh being replaced by Brian Miller, Kelly Leach and Jane Brubaker, the first portion of the meeting was spent electing new officers and assigning board appointments, and the structural corrections that have been made. Concealed hand gun ordinance, summer school, and handbook changes were also addressed.

Mrs. Brubaker was absent from the meeting. Nick Ketzner was elected president and Dale Hazuka was elected vice president of the board.

Webinar on conceal-carry weapons in schools

With the new legislation on concealed weapons, the school must post the ban-on-guns posters in the schools and on the Cheylin website. Cheylin schools continues to ban weapons on school property with the exception of law enforcement. Current insurance carriers will not cover the liability to districts allowing conceal/carry weapons on campus or properties.

Structural corrections

Mrs. Angelos reported that with the assistance of a structural engineer and architect who assessed this project, 11,000 pounds of sheet rock and plaster have been removed from the weight room ceiling in the elementary school. As a result of this removal the classroom walls

which are directly above the weight room are no longer leaning and the floor is no longer sagging.

Summer school

Janice Churchwell was present to give her report on summer school which was held the last three weeks in June. Classes were taught by three teachers who conducted classes for 18 students with an average attendance of 15 per day.

Handbook changes

Handbook changes include:

- No-after-school tutoring
- Part-time students taking less than five courses will not be allowed to participate in extra-curricular activities with the exception of the graduation ceremony.

• Absences due to illness must present a doctor's note within two school days to qualify for a verified absence.

• College visitation days (2) do not count toward absences.

• Schedule changes are limited to the first three days of the semester.

• Students will not be allowed to take an on-line course if it is currently offered by the district.

• Book rental fees and activity fees will remain the same, but there is an increase in the cost of meals.

In other business

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- The 1960's heater in the district house needs to be replaced and work will be done by Roger Neitzel, St. Francis.

• Dan Carson has been hired as the junior high head volleyball coach.

• Anita Burton was hired as consultant/mentor for 40 days to train the new school counselor.

• The Back-to-School Community and Staff Picnic is set for 6 p.m. on Tuesday Aug. 20, at the Park.


New autos brought to the show grounds
