Local trumpet player Jim Milliken contacted the Denver Brass to make arrangements for this group, which will do a student workshop at 1 p.m. in the band room. Lunch in Sawhill Park will follow at 2 p.m. for the students. Music teachers Debbie Fiala at St. Francis High School and Rose Hengen at Cheylin High School are busy promoting the workshop to their band students.

Mr. Milliken worked with Kathy Brantigan, executive director of the Denver Brass, to book the jazz quintet. In an e-mail this past week she told Jim, "By the way, Jim, the five musicians we are sending to
