Cheyenne County Hospital may be in danger of lower funding

At the Nov. 25 Cheyenne County Hospital board meeting, Shawna Blanka, the hospital's quality and safety coordinator, handed out some information regarding the fragile state of the critical access hospitals. Chey-

enne County Hospital is consid-

ered a critical access hospital. Under a new proposal, advanced as part of a report from the Department of Health and Human Services office of the Inspector General, Medicare would curb enhanced payments to as many as two-thirds of these facilities according to Kaiser health news.

There are 1,330 critical access hospitals across 45 states. This would mean that more than 800 hospitals would lose enhanced Medicare funding for providing healthcare access in remote settings under the proposal.

They survive in large part due to a federal reimbursement structure that provides them funding 1 percent above the cost of providing care. Even with this reimbursement, revenues from other payers often don't cover costs. More than 60 percent of these hospital's revenue comes from government payers, so any payment reductions will have an immense impact on critical access hospital's ability to provide access to rural communities

Kaiser states that the critical access hospital program was intended to financially stabilize small, rural institutions by providing them with higher Medicare reimbursement rates. 
