Kansas Governor Brownback and the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) have proclaimed January "Kansas Radon Action Month" to help educate Kansans about the dangers of radon exposure and encourage actions to identify and address radon problems in the home. Radon is a tasteless, odorless, colorless, naturally occurring radioactive gas which comes from the breakdown of uranium found in nearly all soils. Radon gas moves from the ground under and around your home through cracks and other holes in the foundation.

For Kansas Radon Action Month, the Cheyenne County Health Department will offer free home test kits at the Cheyenne County Health Department at 221 W. First in St. Francis. For more information, go to www.kdheks. gov and follow the Radon Action Month link.

About one out of every three radon measurements performed in Kansas are elevated, being above 4 pCi/l (picoCuries per liter).
