Born in 1921 in Virginia, Bill Overstreet was just another young man who rushed to serve after the bombing of Pearl Harbor. What set Bill apart though was his gift to fly. This would lead him to become a much decorated combat pilot over the airs of Europe.

Bill had named his fighter the 'Berlin Express", and it was in hot pursuit of the enemy. The German thought he could lose the other by flying over the antiaircraft guns of the city. But the American continued to follow, even as the two planes flew below the arches of the Eiffel Tower.

After the ME 109 went down, Bill flew at high speed, just feet above the river and made it safely back to England. That one action was said to have boosted the moral of the resistance fighters on the ground, and in 2009, Bill was awarded the French Legion of Honor in recognition.
