Commissioners discuss airport

karen.k@nwkansas.com The Cheyenne Airport was discussed several times during the Cheyenne County Commissioners' meeting on Friday, Dec. 31.

Representing Grace Flying Service, Robert Grace discussed the maintenance agreement with the county. He said that through the years, the airport has changed. We have gone from a podunk airport to a modern airport. Wages for airport maintenance, Mr. Grace pointed out, has not been adjusted since 1991.

He said that there is more grass to mow and more weed control. We use the county's mower, but when we are spraying, we only have the afternoon to mow. There is also now the presence of bindweed, he said. He asked that when they do spray for weeds that the county consider paying a percent of the cost. Then, because of the wider and longer runway, the present equipment takes much longer to remove the snow.

Mr. Grace asked the commissioners to consider his concerns before they sign the airport maintenance agreement.

Dave Yost, president of the Airport Commission, said he wanted to keep the commissioners informed on what is going on with the airport, including redoing the taxiways. He said there were three choices. The first choice had been eliminated because the angle would take away from the runway. The second, which was less expensive but with the 90-degree angle from the runway, was preferred. The reason for not choosing the third choice was not given. The estimated cost of the preferred

choice was \$785,000 and would be a 90-10 percent cost share with the federal government picking up 90 percent and the county, 10 percent.

Mr. Yost and the commissioners discussed the 5-year improvement plan for the airport. They also discussed snow removal with no decision being made.

Before Mr. Yost left the meeting, he said Pat Stuart is resigning from his position on the commission. The commissioners will be seeking a person to fill the position.

#### Road and bridge department

Dave Flemming, public works director, and Mr. Yost discussed a government state program concerning tractor leases. Mr. Yost said there are very strict rules for the dealer, but he is willing to follow them, thus giving the county a way to save money.

It is a yearly lease, he said. The tractor will need to have a minimum of 150 hours and a maximum of 250 hours in 12 months. The lease is \$20 an hour.

Mr. Flemming said he would like to try the lease program. They have tractors but they have already had to have repairs. With the lease, the company would take care of the repairs. However, he didn't want to sell any of the tractors until they knew how the lease would work out.

The commissioners agreed that the leases sounded reasonable. Mr. Flemming said he would like to try two tractors to start with and the commissioners approved.

The cost for materials to make road signs will come out of the general fund. Mr. Flemming figured the cost would be about \$500. They can no longer take money for sign making out of the 911 fund.
