Low income energy assistance program helps heat homes

Heating your home during the winter months can create a financial burden. In an effort to help keep Kansans warm this winter, the Kansas Department for Children and Families will soon begin accepting applications for its Low Income Energy Assistance

"Although we're experiencing a comfortable January week, winter has just begun," said Phyllis Gilmore, secretary for Department of Children. "The winter months can bring frigid temperatures and we want families to be able to escape the cold in the warmth of their homes."

The energy assistant program provides an annual benefit to help qualifying households pay winter heating bills. Persons with disabilities, older adults and families with children are the primary groups assisted. In 2013, nearly 48,000 households received an average benefit of

To qualify, applicants must be responsible for direct payment of their heating bills. Income eligibility requirements are set at 130 percent of the federal poverty level. The level of benefit varies according to household income, number of people living in the home, type of residence, type of heating fuel, and utility


Applicants must demonstrate that they have made payments on their heating bill two out of the last three months. Those payments must be equal to or exceed \$80 or the total balance due on their energy bills, whichever is

Applications for the program have been mailed to households that received energy assistance last year. Energy assistance ap-

plications are also available at local department of children offices and through partnering agencies. They can be requested by calling 1-800-432-0043.

Applications will be accepted from Jan. 21 to March 31.

All blood types are needed to ensure a reliable supply for patients. A blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age (16 with parental consent in some states), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.
