Building strong bones is very important for healthy living. Vitaents, such as calcium and vitamin min D is also essential for strong bones. Your body needs it for optimum bone strength and to help absorb calcium. However, most people are not getting enough of either of these nutrients. Bones your intake of calcium-rich foods don't come with a lifetime guarantee. They need continuing maintenance or they can weaken and break. If your diet is low in calcium, your body will take calcium from your bones to keep blood calcium at normal levels. or a lifetime of healthy bones:

- · Consume at least three servings of low-fat or fat-free milk or other dairy products every day.
- Supplement your diet with calcium from calcium-fortified foods and beverages, if you don't or can't consume milk. • Follow an overall healthy eat-
- ing plan using the "MyPlate" food guidance system. • Be physically active with
- walking, running, playing sports, dancing, weight training, etc.

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
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
