Kansas Day celebration brings a big crowd

bc.times@nwkansas.com On Jan. 29, 1861, Kansas was formed as a state to become the thirty-fourth state in the Union. Last Wednesday afternoon, close to 200 people turned out for the eighty-fifth Kansas Day potluck and celebration program, held in the American Legion Hall. Shirley Watson set at a table containing memorabilia on Charles Wesley and Cynthia Annie Maxson Trickett, the founders of Cheyenne County Kansas Day in 1930.

Marsha Magley, Vernetta Haack, Phyllis Wright and Rosemary Powell were at the registration table to greet everyone as they came in the door, and to have them sign in under the list containing the year they were born. Everyone was given a badge to wear, identifying who they were.

Other tables were set up with memorabilia by the following participating Homesteaders and groups: Helene Landenberger had a display containing a book with the complete history of the Magley family, Homesteaders, and other memorabilia items of interest. She was on hand to answer questions anyone had on the homestead.

Dan Busse had a large display showing the history of buffalo in Cheyenne County during the years of 1850-1900. The center of his display contained a very fragile buffalo skull he found in a spring on the property his grandparents homesteaded. In 1974, this spring had formed a pond, and he was told the spring water and fine sand is what helped to enne County members who had preserve the skull. When he had it analyzed by an archeologist, they told him this animal was ap-

proximately 5-6 years old when it died, between one to two thousand years ago.

Kenneth Beougher had a display of the Finney and Eula Jones Farmstead, established in 1930. His also had his proudest item, a copy of his grandfathers Homestead Certificate, established in 1892, and signed by Benjamin Harrison, the President of the United States. Mike Boyson, a homestead ancestor, had a display of his Hot Brush Sign business, and was ready to answer any questions any one had.

The Home Circle Club ladies proudly displayed items from their homestead ancestors. The center of this display had a large quilt that the ladies together had made from the sunbonnet pattern. Ladies from this group stood out, as they were all dressed in their homestead attire and sunbonnets. These ladies were: Dana Clendenin, Joy Anderegg, Avis Hazuka, Carol Peters, Phyllis Wright, Dorothy Chipperfield, and Carol Marsh. Mrs. Chipperfield displayed an antique violin that had been owned by her late brother, Mux Johnson.

The Wesleyan Church Ladies decorated the tables with homestead kitchen utensils, provided by Kenneth Beougher.
