Twenty residents attended the Nov. 14 meeting in the Century II offices, and brainstormed projects and programs they would like to see accomplished in their community.

This will be the third set of town hall meetings to create and update a strategic plan for the Bird City community in nine years. The group was divided into two groups, Social and Physical Environments. Lots of progress has been made towards the goals set. Some goals have been completed and others are in progress.

The Social Environment goals set are as follows: Chey-

lin fundraiser, Bird City Clinic Expansion, gym floor in Mc-Donald resurfacing, adding a dentist/optometrist to the clinic, portable outdoor theater system, and installing a better warning system for protection in case of storm, tragedy or disaster. Updating the sound system in the McDonald gymnasium, updating the current scoreboard, and setting up a bike path in the perimeter of the town.

Goals of the Physical Environment are: Tearing down the old theater building, locating designated storm shelters throughout the city in event of tornado or other disaster, lodging options for hunters, bicyclists, family or community events, landscaping in the round-about area, rentals and housing for future growth, painting or wrapping the water tower as a birdhouse, and enhancing the recycling area.


