On February 26, 1889, an election was held to determine the permanent county seat with the town of St. Francis receiving the majority of the votes. Discord continued regarding the matter with questions of the legality of the election and in 1891, the legislature passed an act, which was approved by Gov. Lyman U. Humphrey, declaring the election legal and the permanent county seat to remain St. Francis.

In this time of dwindling rural population, I find it unfortunate that not all residents of both cities are willing to openly work together to improve the quality of life for all people in Cheyenne County. The census in 2010 for our county was 2,726 – which is the second lowest since 1890 when the population boomed at 4.401.
