Fulfilling requirements set forth by the county commissioners, the Cheyenne County Hospital Board held a special meeting on Monday to hear from New Light Healthcare, a management company from Texas. Since this process began earlier this year, it has been met with some resistance from hospital employees. Many have voiced concerns over the possibility of a turn over and what that would mean for the employees. Some of the concerns include the benefits employees currently have, the contracts that Great Plains Health Alliance currently has for the hospital with supply companies, insurance companies and Medicaid, and also the ability for the potential management candidates to provide the same training, support and education that Great Plains provides. These are just some of the concerns that have been brought up by employees in the meetings.
