KSDE assessment tests

Shelly Angelos reported the state assessment tests had some very unusual problems that caused inaccurate test scores. Because of this, the Kansas State Department of Education will not be reporting any individual, building, district or state level assessment scores for 2014.

There were enough students who completed the assessments that test questions could be analyzed. CETE will produce a report showing the areas students did well in or did not do well in. Next year's testing will be another year for assessment purposes. By 2016 the state testing bugs should be worked out and the state assess-

ment scores will count.

She married her high school sweetheart and they moved to the farm where they raised their family.


