After enjoying Christmas day together on Friday, the Bauers left for his parents at Pleasanton and the Kasson family returned to their home.


Dean and Margaret Brown were guests at Bob and Deanna Propes' Christmas party on Dec. 20.



## WEEKLY SERMONETTE By Jerry Cummings, Pastor of Living Hope

**Fellowship in Norton** In Philippians 3:13-14 we read, "Brethren, I do not count myself to have apprehended (arrived); but one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind and reaching forward to

those things which are ahead. I press toward the goal, for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus.'

As we begin this new year it is a time of looking forward to what may lie ahead in the coming year. In this verse in Philippians, Paul talks about the priority of the future over the past. He especially emphasizes reaching forward (future) to reach that destiny which God has called us into. In order to reach the possibilities God has for us, the past must be put behind us. This is hard sometimes because the past is so certain and our future seems so uncertain. But the flipside is this: the past can never be changed, but the future is full of possibilities for change.

The past however, does have at least a couple of important aspects. First, the past must be remembered in the sense of learning from past mistakes. Also the past is important in terms of remembering how God has been faithful, and done great things. This reminds us to trust him with our future.
