Horse Council asks city to help enclose arena

By VERONICA MONIER The Norton County Horse to \$500,000. Council wants to enclose its arena but it needs the city's help.

Horse Council President Scott Sproul visited with the Norton City Council at its meeting Wednesday about the proposed enclosure, which would be larger than allowed under the present agreement with the city.

Mr. Sproul said the enclosure would be handicap accessible and meet fire code. It would have its own sound system, restrooms, seating stand, office and concessions area, and would be wired so it could be used by the Arts Council or other agencies for concerts and events.

He said scheduling fees would pay for maintenance and utilities.

The council is looking for an engineer and would need to put fencing around some of the race track to ensure safety.

Mr. Sproul said the council will be applying for the tax credit program to pay for the project. With the program, business and individuals can buy the tax credits and take them off of their taxes.

"That's money that would stay in the community instead of going to Topeka," he said.

"We're looking at this as an economic development project. If we have about three big events, then that brings people in and they will spend money here. Mr. Sproul said while things aren't all set, a small fee would probably be charged to cover the cost of the utilities and maintenance.

Later in the meeting, Mr. Briery said he isn't sure about the proposed arena.

"We may need to look at moving it before anything new gets built," he said. "I'm not saying I'm against it or for it, but I think we need to take a long look at what we might be getting into here."

Councilman George Jones agreed.

However, the city approved a revised agreement with the horse council for the tract of land in Elmwood Park directly west of the race track rail. The agreement would need to be amended if their proposed improvement project is funded.

In other business, the council: • Held a public hearing for dis-

McCook said the city will have six months after getting the loan from the state for the improvements before making the first payment. Sewer rates will need to be raised to pay for the loan.

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• Contributed \$1,500 to replace "How is this facility going to the lights around the racetrack and authorized city staff to put up the lights.

Councilman Jerry Hawks said the money will be taken from the electric fund because of the anticipated savings from the new energy-efficient lights. Norton County also contributed money from its park fund.

· Heard from Mr. Briery that in October the council approved a bid of \$6,680 from Powerhouse Diesel Services for the inspection of engine No. 7 at the power plant. He said because the representative from the company has had health problem, they haven't been able to reach him and he hasn't completed the work.

The council decided to approve an estimate of \$6,750 plus travel fees from Cooper Energy Services for the inspection of engines No. 7 and No. 8, and decided to notify Powerhouse that another firm has been hired to do the work.
