

Norton County may get a lawyer to help solve a dispute over jail and communication services with the City of Norton.

The sheriff and city manager have been working to hammer out an agreement that will work for both the county and city but there are still several sticking points.

The city wants some changes before signing an agreement with the sheriff's office to provide jail and dispatch services. An old contract, which expires in December, said the city would pay 40 percent of the dispatch expense up to \$44,000. However, because the cost of dispatching has increased over the last couple of years, the county wants to remove the cap.

In 2002 when the expense was more than the cap, the city paid. However, last year it refused to pay more than \$44,000 when it got a bill for \$67,000.

On Monday commissioners met with City Administrator Rob Lawson in the morning and they reconvened in the afternoon to discuss the problem.

"We're getting whickered," Commission Chairman Leroy Lang said. "I think they should pay the \$23,000 that they owe us. They created a change in the contract when they paid over the cap before and I think they should have to pay it now."

"What's wrong with that?" said Mr. Kruse.

Sheriff Thomson said there was nothing wrong with it and the city seems willing to go along with that idea.

Mr. Lang said he still felt they had voided the contract by paying over the cap for the past three years and that he wasn't going to sign the agreement until they paid the other \$23,000.

"The reason the cap is there is because we and the city failed to renegotiate the contract," Sheriff Thomson said. "We are not any less at fault than they are."

Sheriff Thomson told the commissioners that if they didn't sign the contract it would be bad for taxpayers because the county would still have to employ five dispatchers and would still have to have 24-hour service. So would the city.



# Accident raises questions

After a Colby basketball player put his hand through a window in a door in the Norton gym during a game three weeks ago, the Norton School District is asking questions about the structure and placement of doors and windows in the gym.

Norton Superintendent Greg Mann said he contacted the district's architect and the state fire marshal after Shane Stover put his arm through a window in one of the interior gym doors.

The school hasn't heard back from the fire marshal yet and won't know what will be done with the doors until it has. Mr. Mann said if the doors are there for fire and smoke control, then they will look into what other kinds of doors are available. If not, he said, the district's options are almost unlimited.

He said the school feels bad about what happened, but doesn't believe the district is responsible.

"It was a highly unusual thing that happened," he said. "I think it's odd that both sides of the glass broke and the window had a hole in it. Normally only one side will shatter."

He said the doors were put in in 1976 and this is only the second accident in that time. The first happened in the '80s in a physical education class. That time the glass just cracked on one side like it was supposed to.

He said although districts aren't required to carry insurance on their students, the Norton district does. All members of the activities association have catastrophic insurance. Also, the district carries a secondary accident policy which covers all student activities at home and away.

Mr. Mann said he heard Shane was doing well and will be going to a specialist in Denver.


