Twelve Seconds of Proof — Rick Rostek, Pastor, Immanuel Lutheran Church

In The Passion of the Christ, Mel Gibson accomplished his goal of showing the horrible suffering and death of Jesus Christ. For Christians, experiencing the depth of this horror serves to deepen our understanding of God's love for all humans that He would send His Son to suffer in our place so that we might have forgiveness of sins. But the best part of the movie, the most important part, I dare say, was almost an afterthought.

That Jesus of Nazareth was an extraordinary person is beyond question. The bookshelves can hardly hold all that has been written about him. From the circumstances of His conception and birth, to the teachings and miracles, and yes, to his death, the life of Jesus was truly remarkable. But His life and death would have meant nothing without the Resurrection. Jesus Christ really did rise from the dead, proving that He is the very Son of God, sent into the world to save

people from their sins.

If not for the Resurrection, I and all other Christians would still be dead in our sins and without hope. But

with the Resurrection, we are assured of forgiveness, life, and salvation. And Jesus offers this same forgiveness, life, and salvation to all people freely, at no cost. Mel Gibson spent two hours showing, in great detail, the suffering of the Christ. But it was the last twelve seconds of the movie that made it all worthwhile. Jesus, who was dead, is alive! As the angel said to the women who had come to Jesus, tomb, "Why are you looking for the living among the dead? He is not here, He has risen!" He has risen, indeed. Hallelujah!
